# School Council Meeting Admin Report May 13th, 2025

**Musicfest:** (Please welcome Kristi Baratelli) Thank you for your incredible support of this year's Music Fest. Your encouragement, enthusiasm, and presence helped make this evening such a meaningful celebration of the arts. Whether cheering from the audience, helping your child prepare, or simply showing up with a smile, your involvement enriches our school community and reminds our students how valued their creativity is. We are truly grateful to be part of a community that champions music, performance, and the joy of learning together.

## UFLI and Core Phonics Information (Appendix A)

- 1. **Short vowels in CVC words**: **CVC** stands for Consonant-Vowel-Consonant. This category involves words like "cat," "dog," and "pen," where the vowel sound is short.
- 2. **Consonant blends with short vowels**: This category includes words where two or more consonants are blended together, followed by a short vowel sound, such as "bl" in "black" or "st" in "stop."
- 3. **Short vowels, digraphs, and -tch trigraph: Digraphs** are pairs of letters that make a single sound, like "sh" in "ship" or "ch" in "chat." **Trigraphs** involve three letters making a single sound, such as "tch" in "match."
- 4. **R-controlled vowels**: These are vowels followed by an "r" that alters their sound, like "ar" in "car," "or" in "fork," and "er" in "her."
- 5. **Long vowel spellings**: This category includes words where the vowel sound is long, often represented by combinations like "ai" in "rain," "ea" in "seat," or silent "e" as in "cake."
- 6. **Variant vowels**: Variant vowels are vowel sounds that are spelled in different ways, such as "oo" in "book" and "ou" in "soup."
- 7. **Low frequency vowel and consonant spellings**: This category covers less common vowel and consonant combinations, such as "au" in "author" or "ph" in "phone."
- 8. **Multisyllabic words**: These are words with more than one syllable, like "basketball," "elephant," and "university."

**COPE** (Collaborative Outreach Preventing Exploitation): Springbank Middle School, in partnership with SMS School Council, has invited the <u>Collaborative Outreach Preventing Exploitation</u> (COPE) Program to our community to provide valuable information about students learning to navigate independence and the challenges the face.

<u>COPE</u> is a voluntary support program for youth ages 12–24 who may be at risk of, or impacted by, child exploitation—whether in the community or online. Their goal is to work with young people and families on preventative strategies and warning signs about personal safety, healthy relationships, and provide and connect with helpful resources. While this initiative focuses on student safety, it addresses the difficult and often harsh realities associated with child exploitation. As such, this session will be focused on content meant for adults and young adult not suitable for younger students.

COPE will be in our community to provides valuable education and awareness session for our families on topics like healthy relationships, personal safety, and preventing exploitation. Earlier this year, the staff at Springbank Middle School participated in professional learning with the COPE program and recognized the meaningful impact of its message. As a result, we felt it was important to extend this opportunity to our broader community to support awareness, education, and family engagement around this important issue.





# **UFLI** and Core Phonics

- Jodi working on collecting data
- January: groups formed based on Core Phonics survey, if scored low in one category, placed there (not necessarily low in all categories)
- Groups progressed over 4 months, survey done again to track progression
- Skills progression: initial phonemes (sounds), short vowel CVC words to multisyllabic words foundation for grade 4 and up (descriptive language for reading/writing)
- Dec (blue bar)/May (green bar): improvement in all categories, for all grade 3/4

- Grade 3: on the cusp of developing strong literacy skills which will help with longer writing pieces in Grade 4 onwards
- Grade 3 FI: first year of English instruction
- Grade 3/4 FI concerns re: English, seeing these results, looks very promising
- Grade 3 overall intense growth
- Grade 4 English: started at higher benchmark, only students who had UFLI last year
- Plan: before end of school year, run core phonics survey for all grade 2's to identify who needs intervention in grade 3 next year. K/1/2 will use UFLI as whole class next year with small group intervention as needed
- Question about how many students present for assessments: All students present for assessment's except in one instance 1 Grade 4 student away, new students who joined midyear left out of this data along with 1 Grade 4 student who moved away
- Question about grouping: students scoring 13/15 needed some intervention, 12 or lower need more intensive intervention. Graph only showing students achieving 14+ (lots on the cusp, but aren't included in this data)
- Question about how many other schools using UFLI: recommended tool RV has implemented, handful of schools it's required, some receiving additional intervention (using this as a tool)

#### **EDUCATION FUNDING**

An educated society is one of the cornerstones of a democratic society. There is a cost. For the 2025.2026 school year, almost 11 billion dollars in education funding and another 47 billion over 3 years for school builds and improvements through the School Accelerator Program.

The provincial government implemented a 4.5 percent hike in the Education Property Tax (EPT), which was frozen in the 2024-25 budget year. Municipalities collect the EPT for the provincial government. The EPT is levied alongside municipal property taxes, based on the value of the property. "Even with all those dollars collected province-wide and including this 4.5% increase, the Education Property taxes will only cover 31.6 percent of the K to 12 education budget," Superintendent Luterbach stated in an

interview with Rocky View Weekly. General revenues of taxes collected across the province will pay the remaining shortfall. The educational system's success is important to all taxpayers as our students are our next generation of innovators, leaders and citizens.

Just as our society evolves and changes, so does our educational system. Our schools are responding to many changes. Since COVID, there has been a significant increase in the number of students dealing with emotional issues. As a normal part of the curriculum, students are learning strategies to deal with anxiety and social pressures. The Alberta curriculum has been revised to include financial literacy as a component from K-12. The curriculum also now includes a career development component from K-12. The focus is to provide students an opportunity to explore different careers as they progress through the grades, with high school students can explore the trades, participate in post-secondary opportunities and take on job training.

School systems deal with the many medical needs of students; this includes facility adaptations, specialized equipment, tools and staff.

Literacy and numeracy are more important than ever in our digital world; thus the focus is on ensuring students receive early intervention.

#### **CONSTRUCTION FUNDING**

Rocky View Schools has been the recipient of new school announcements from the School Accelerator Program through its advocacy initiatives and support from parents and communities. There are a total of 8 projects approved for Rocky View to address our need for classroom space for students.

#### **CARBON TAX**

ASBA (Alberta School Board Association) has been advocating both provincially and nationally on the position statement related to carbon tax: That school boards be fully rebated the cost of the carbon tax or levy (SGM 2016). Following his swearing-in as Prime Minister, Mike Carney removed the consumer carbon tax effective April 1 through an Order in Council (OIC). Further details will be available in the federal OIC database soon. School Boards are advocating for this tax to be removed from school boards.

#### **EDWIN PARR NOMINEE**

Cochrane High School teacher Connor Benson is this year's Rocky View Schools (RVS) Edwin Parr Award Nominee. The Edwin Parr Award annually recognizes excellent first-year teachers across Alberta. Every year, teachers from ASBA member school boards across the province are nominated to receive the award. RVS is part of ASBA Zone 5. The Zone 5 celebration takes place on May 30, 2025.

#### Discussion:

- 3 SHS students achieved 100% on their Bio 30
- Hope incumbent will push for SMS expansion (on 3 year plan but at the end)

#### Standards of Education:

- Demands for dealing with neurodivergence and medical issues is difficult, unions have brought up during negotiations, offer rejected
- If child coded, money does not go to that child, a percentage of pot of money does
- Division looks at how to best serve needs of those kids

- Gifted/talented, medically fragile (tube feeds, injections, diapering) kids used to be in hospital and teachers went there. In 1975, Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) changed everything, moved kids into the classroom
- Kids kept alive earlier with multiple problems, rise in Autism and medically fragile
- First placement is regular classroom, sometimes pull-outs or nurse brought in
- 3 PBIS specialists, Stepping Stones mental health coaching from community, supervisor, 5 psychologists, SLP, OT, PT, family liaisons, learning supports, deaf and blind aids
- Special Education Act amended June 20, 2004
- ASBA resolution 8 years ago, requested best practice and how to fund that (hasn't come because of cost)
- Teachers finding it hard, something has to happen
- Parents challenging what's happening in schools, lawsuits
- Adaptive equipment, modified bathrooms
- Allocation of space (extra for special needs)
- Awareness, advocacy for change in this area needed
  - o EA learn medical?
  - o LPN learn learning support?
  - o What's easier/best, hiring LPN vs EA (one school did)
- 27,000 students in RV (1% severe behaviour, 5% just below)
- 65 Learning Support (LS) centrally, 1.36 LS teachers plus assistants (IES funding isn't enough to cover needs)
- How can we re-structure schools, addiction counselors in high schools now, society changing in so many ways
- Want to be inclusive, everyone getting the best they can, current structure not working
- Psychologist's work with staff, don't assess
- Some most severe might go to specialized setting for 6 weeks after months of attempting intervention, but ultimately up to school to manage
- Supports brought in: shadow teacher, provide insight/coaching, IPP, meet with parents
- Teachers supported by admin
- Parents: advocate to MLA's
- Schools put on a good face, but very complex and not getting easier
